

Introduction of our Pastor, Reverend F. Bernard Fuller



The information below was written by Nannie Helen Burroughs in the early 1900s with minor additions. It reads as if it were written yesterday. Most sentences begin with—"<u>The Negro Must</u> … "

Put first things first: educations, development of good character traits, a trade, and home ownership.

Stop expecting God and White folk to do for him what he can and should do for himself.

Keep himself, his children and his home clean, and make the surroundings in which he lives clean and attractive.

Learn to dress more appropriately for work and for leisure. Knowing what to wear, how to wear it, and where to wear it are earmarks of common sense, culture and character.

Make his religion an everyday practice and not just a Sunday-go-to-meeting emotional affair.

Resolve to wipe out mass ignorance. Leaders must teach and inspire other.

Stop charging his failures to his "color or race" and to white people's attitude. Good service and conduct will make senseless race prejudice fade.

Overcome his bad job habits.

Improve his conduct in public places.

Operate business for people—not only Negro people.

The average so-called educated Negro will have to come down out of the air. He is too inflated over nothing.

Stop forgetting friends. These friends not only pray, speak, write, influence others, but make unbelievable, unpublished sacrifices and contribution for the advancement of the race. The Negro must make his heart warm with gratitude, his lips sweet with thanks and his heart and mind resolute with purpose to justify the sacrifices and to stand on his feet and go forward. "God is no respecter of persons. In every nation, he that feareth him and worketh righteousness is sure to win. Get to work, too much time is spent talking. In spite of race prejudice, America is brim full of opportunities. Go after them!


Pamela McNeill-Shaw Receives Master of Arts in Communication

CONSTIUTION AND BYLAWS ADOPTED

On the 29th of November, MPMBC met in a scheduled meeting for the purpose of officially adopting its Constitution and Bylaws. A committee of five met many times and hammered out the material to meet the needs of the congregation and anyone who serves as pastor.

Committee members were Ellen McNeill, Johnny Allen, Marie Daniel, Marvin Keller and John Monroe. Pastor Fuller provided the book, *Church Responsible Party Procedure for Church Trustees - A Church Compliance Quick Reference Handbook by Janet V. Kennedy-Jacobs*, which had sample material as well as a disk that could be used for a modern day church to adopt parts for its situation. Committee members diligently worked to ensure that the document provided to the congregation fully represented Mount Pisgah Church for today and for at least three years in the future. The Constitution will remain; however, as changes are made, the Bylaws may be revised and/or changes made to serve the present age.

At the scheduled Church meeting on the 5th of July individuals received a copy of the proposed Construction and Bylaws and were charged with reading the material and providing any information that they felt should be considered. Pastor Fuller read some information he felt should be included, and informed the members he would ensure that material be included in the final document to be adopted by the church.

During the meeting on the 29th, Pastor Fuller read those changes which had been included in the document. After having read the changes, the congregation voted to adopt the document in its entirety. With the Holy Bible as its primary source for Christian living, the adoption of our constitution and bylaws afford the members of due process and a means to protect our Church in legal matters. Each member is encouraged to pick up a signed copy of the document and keep it in a safe place.
