Jeanette Sutton was born in Durham County to John Rozier and Maggie O'Neill. Maggie couldn't support Jeanette so she gave custody of Jeanette to Robert and Molissia Buxton. As the story goes Molissia couldn't have children. Maggie sent word that she wanted to give up her daughter to Molissia. Molissa, thinking her husband Robert wouldn't let her keep Jeanette, had a family friend drive to Durham and pick up Jeanette and place her under a walnut tree in the Buxton's yard. Molissia pretended to find Jeanette after hearing a baby crying outside. Robert and Molissia raised Jeanette as their own. When Jeanette found out the Buxtons were not her biological parents, she said she was going to create a lot of blood relatives.

Roy Lee Sutton joined the army in 1948. He served in both the Korean and Vietnam wars. During the Korean War in 1950, he was shot. Word came to the US that he was killed. Jeanette was distraught. A few days later she found that he was in the hospital at Ft Bragg. *Roy earned the Purple Heart.*

Mt. Pisgah as It Relates to Black History

If we look at the history of Mt. Pisgah, we can see parallels of events reflected throughout Black History in America. First of all, our church was birthed about 35 years after the Civil War when Blacks were just beginning to experience freedom from bondage. There were struggles, challenges, and open hostility towards the newly freed Blacks. Likewise, even in starting this church, Reverend Anderson McNeill did so in the face of threats and danger, but he persisted and built the first Mt. Pisgah structure, and today, despite past challenges and tough situations, the church still stands, 118 vears later. Over the years, the church was destroyed twice by fires, was once fire-bombed, but it still survived. In 2015, the church faced imminent foreclosure but survived. Approximately a month after celebrating our 118th Homecoming Anniversary this year, the church suffered a split, with probably more than half the membership leaving. Taking solace and assurance from God, the church will continue to stand, recognizing that many things must change as we rely on the promises and sovereignty of God, and God, alone. Sometimes, churches are named for different reasons, but this church was named because of the vision Reverend McNeill received as he looked over what he considered, the Promise Land for the Blacks in the community needing land and a place to worship. Mt. Pisgah, built upon a vision and a promise, will stand as a testament to the promises of God and faith of those who trust Him. We trust Him with the same faith in Psalm 121 *I will lift up my eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help; my help cometh from the Lord.*

Team has hit the ground rolling! The ministry met on Saturday, December 15th to discuss how to involve our church more in the community,





AVOID TAX SCAMS


(Information from the State Employees Credit Union)

According to the N. C. Department of Revenue some red flags are below:

- They will NOT contact you by phone or in person unless the agency has already sent you a notification in the U. S. mail.
- They will NOT require a specific payment method. Never purchase gift cards and give them to individuals or mail them. Neither should you ever give information off the card to someone on the phone.
- They will NOT ask for your social security number, birthdate, etc. as they already have that information.
- They will NOT tell you that unless you immediately pay you will go to jail or have your bank account frozen.

Be alert and NEVER—NOT EVER give out your social security number or bank account number by phone. Companies you do business with already have all of your personal information. When someone tries to pressure you, hang up the phone!

done when we work together for common causes. There is strength in numbers. Houston courts will





- Current banks statements
- Records of any grants, scholarships, or other income that was included in your parents 2017 adjusted gross income statement.

Everyone involved needs to set aside the time to secure all documentation and to complete the FAFSA form tougher.

Students attending schools in the Hoke County System may apply for the White Oak School Scholarship. Applications are available in the Guidance Office March 1 - 31, 2019.
