SAVING MONEY IDEAS

Uses of Vinegar (Copied off a vinegar bottle) and the Internet)

- Soothe bug bites or stings by dabbing the irritated area with a cotton ball soaked in vinegar.
- Spray undiluted on weeds and grass on walkways and driveways.
- Remove soap scum, hard water stains and mildew from bathtubs, tile and glass by wiping the area with a rag soaked in vinegar. Rinse well.
- Remove rust from stainless steel by soaking overnight in undiluted vinegar. Rinse well.
- Remove odors from the washing machine by running one cup of vinegar through a normal cycle without clothing.
- **Freshen up the fridge.** Clean the shelves and walls with a solution of half water and half vinegar.
- **Brighten coffee cups and teacups.** Gently scrub stains with equal parts vinegar and salt (or baking soda).
- **Eliminate odors.** Swab plastic containers with a cloth dampened with vinegar.
- **Kill bathroom germs.** Spray full-strength vinegar around the sink and tub. Wipe clean with a damp cloth.

• Save a garment. To remove light scorch marks on fabrics, rub gently with vinegar. Wipe with a clean cloth. This technique also works on antiperspirant stains. Check the Web for other ideas.

MISSIONARIES IN ACTION

Recently our Mission Ministry joined with Church Women United to provide migrant worker kits. NC Dept. of Labor estimates 100,000 to 200,000 migrant workers work in our state each year, many enduring substandard conditions. Through the generous donations of our Mount Pisgah church family we were able



to provide 180 kits. Several members spent an afternoon assembling three types of kits which consisted of food, hygiene and school items. The kits



were taken to the collection site at Haymount Presbyterian Church. From there the kits were picked up and transported to Migrant Farmworker Camps where they were to be dispersed.
