

#### JENNIFER KELLY, CERTIFIED FRAUD EXAMINER

Fayetteville Police Department recently announced Detective Jennifer Kelly has successfully completed the certification process to become a Certified Fraud Examiner. The process takes about 12 months and requires a rigorous academic course load, focusing in the areas of Fraud Prevention and Deterrence, Financial Transactions and Fraud



Schemes, Investigations and Law.

With each course of study, the candidate is mandated to take an individual exam on each course section. This exam requires countless hours of studying and preparation in order to successfully pass the individual exam. Once the candidate successfully proves they are competent to attempt the certification test, the Association of Certified Fraud Examiners grants the candidate the ability to take the exam. This test consists of four (4) individual sections, which are timed and require the candidate to use their knowledge without the use of notes or books. Each candidate is only allowed two (2) attempts in order to pass the certification exam. If they fail the examination after the second attempt, the candidate must complete the entire validation process from the beginning.

Detective Kelly is the first Fayetteville Police Officer to achieve this outstanding achievement and become a Certified Fraud Examiner. Congratulations Sis. Kelly, a church member and our Children's Church Leader.

Fayetteville Cumberland County Ministerial Council celebrated the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. during its 25<sup>th</sup> Annual Prayer Breakfast with a record crowd of about 1400 people in attendance.

One growing feature of the annual event is to include more children and youth to raise their level of awareness as it relates to Dr. King and the whole Civil Rights Movement.

As a result, the Pledge of Allegiance was led by a local Brownie Troop and three Teens from Fay-Cumberland Youth

Council recited excerpts from three of King's famous speeches.



A highlight of the event was the parade of Faces of the Community where about 50 people representing all aspects of life marched into the auditorium: the young, the old, the handicapped, wheel chair bound, rich, poor, Democrat, Republican, HIV activists, veterans, Native Americans, Africans, Muslims, Christians and others depicting the rich diversity of our community.

The music was provided by our own Mount Pisgah Mass Choir who made us all so proud, as well as the Scholarship Appeal by our



former church member, Rev. DeMarious McNeill who lit up the audience with his unique style. We also had a first time ever visit by a governor to this event. Governor Roy Cooper showed up and surprised the delighted crown (although we had known before Christmas but could not share the information). He gave some words of encouragement followed by the

### Hoke County Union Young Adult Session



### MOUNT PISGAH CHURCH, A DIFFERENT POINT OF VIEW

History allows us the ability to remember significant people and past events that have shaped the world in which we live. This is why every year the month of February is designated as Black History Month. On Feb. 1, 1926, Carter G. Woodson initiated "Negro History Week", which evolved into Black History Month when President Gerald Ford officially expanded it in 1976. Today, it is celebrated annually in most countries around the world.



Black History Month was originally started to address the way Black historical figures were represented in American schools. In American schools African Americans were usually represented as slaves or colonial subjects. Today, Black History Month is celebrated to raise awareness and acknowledge the accomplishments and influential experiences of black men and women. Black history is not merely the history of African Americans it is also our history as American people and the central role of blacks in U.S. history.

Black History Month and the continued usefulness of the celebration is an annual source for debate. Some question the fairness of a designated month dedicated to the history of one race. Others question why should the celebration of Black History be confined to one month, as opposed to the integration of Black history into the mainstream education for the rest of the year. Lastly, many believe the celebration is racist.

Here at Mount Pisgah, Black History Month is celebrated. As part of the celebration, each Sunday in the month of February we were enlightened with a Black History moment. For our Black History moment, the youth at Mount Pisgah educated the congregation on influential and notable figures in Hoke County. On the third Sunday, February 18, the congregation learned of our church's founder and its humble beginnings.

Mount Pisgah was founded in 1900 by Reverend Anderson McNeill. This was following the Civil War and the Ku Klux Klan was flourishing in the south. The KKK would terrorize Blacks. African American educators and preachers especially were targets of hatred and violence. Forming a church for Blacks during this time was dangerous. Some White churches allowed Blacks to worship in their balconies or sit outside windows to hear the Gospel. Our congregation worshipped in Galatia Presbyterian Church, which is still in existence in Cumberland County.

By the Grace of God, Mount Pisgah has persevered for 118 years. We have survived two fires and an explosion. Most recently we survived a mismanagement of church funds, which divided the congregation and left the church finances in ruins. Mount Pisgah has gone from its original brush arbor structure to the brick and mortar building you see today. We have over 300 active members and we will continue to grow under our new leadership.

Mount Pisgah like so many African American Churches had to struggle to overcome adversity. The history of the African American people is a history of struggle.

The annual observation of Black History Month is a time to remember that African Americans have made significant contributions to every segment of American society — religion, business, arts and entertainment, science, literature, politics, and law. Celebrating Black History Month honors African American accomplishments throughout history while also educating the younger generations about the role of African Americans in society and the struggles and challenges they have faced.

The only way to find out if you qualify for financial aid is to first be informed about **your potential funding options**. If you've been putting off going back to school because it seems unaffordable, it may be time to find out if you qualify for any type of financial aid. First, here are the popular types of financial aid that may be available for qualified students use to help pay for college:

**Grants:** Schools may award grants to qualified students in addition to those available through the government to those who qualify. Your grades, heritage, religious affiliation, and other factors may qualify you for student loans: The advisor you speak to may know if the school you are matched with offers private loans and which federal loans you may be eligible to pursue. Military options: If you are or were in the military, be sure to ask a representative at the school you plan to attend what your funding options may be.
